



A fitting quote to describe this year's freshman trip to Patrick's Point. With high hopes, and an even higher sun in the sky the freshmen set out on the annual adventure of the Patrick's Point trip dry and ready for anything.

Day One: Despite a departure time of 6:00AM, students arrived with gear in hand and a smile on their face. After an informative tour of Humboldt State University, the students were excited to begin their adventures at Patrick's Point State Campground. The freshmen set up camp quickly and headed down to the tide pools. Arriving right at the lowest point of low tide it was a joy to watch the students skipping from rock to rock discovering all the unique life you can find hiding amongst the small pools. Students found everything; from star fish and mussels, to crabs, they truly found the ocean to be full of life.

Day 2: A slight drizzle during the night put a "damper" on things, but not the attitude of the freshmen as they started their day out with a 4 hour hike. After lunch it was off to Agate Beach for an amazing time of searching for agates, playing on the sand hill and just being with friends. However during this fun time, a storm was brewing and rain was coming. The rain arrived about 2:30pm, estimates are about an inch and a half of rain in about 3 hours time would fall on us. Hero's arise when times are tough and one such hero was parent chaperone Mr. Matthews, who by using 40 foot tarps was able to help construct a temporary 20 foot high teepee like structure to help give the kids somewhere dry to hang out. Rallying quickly the staff was able to mobilize and find safe, warm and dry accommodations for all the students.

Day 3: Thanks to administration, busses were due to arrive earlier than originally planned, now came the task of breaking down some very wet camps. With warm pancakes to help lighten the mood, students set about quickly folding up tents and belongings, loading the busses and heading for home. Most students were quite glad to be home and headed for a warm shower and a cozy bed.

While the rain may have overshadowed the trip, it is important to remember that memories were made, friendships strengthened and adversity was overcome. The freshmen chose not to complain, but instead made the best of it. Working together to make sure people had dry clothes to wear, sharing blankets and jackets and listening and following direction from the staff; they took what could have been viewed as a negative situation and helped make it a success. A lasting memory from the trip is of a student coming over and getting a cup of hot chocolate, looking up they smiled and said "thank you!" before they scampered back out in the less than hospitable weather to stand near the fire. A truly unique trip and one that will go down in history, but one that was successful simply because the students wanted it to be that way.



Looking forward to November, we will be hosting our annual food drive on November 1-17. All students are encouraged to donate unexpired, packaged food in their History classes.





I didn't see a frowning face which, I feel, is the correct assessment to measure the success of the evening".

2017 Community Creek Clean Up











Driving Smart to Stay Safe

U-Prep is pleased to host the Start Smart Program presented by the CHP on Wednesday, November 29th in the Marr Auditorium at 5:30pm. Start Smart is aimed at helping newly licensed- or soon to be licensed-teenage drivers (15-19) become more aware of the responsibilities that accompany the privilege of being a licensed California driver. The newly licensed teenage driver and their parents/ guardians are invited to attend and participate in a free 2 hour long Start Smart presentation. CHP officers speak directly to the newly licensed driver and their parents/guardians through candid conversations, discussing topics such as collision avoidance techniques along with collision causing elements such as excessive speed, DUI, and distracted driving. 




U-PREP VOLUNTEER POLICY
