




Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat is coming to the Marr Auditorium!!


Fall Carnival








Varsity Volleyball defeated Colusa High in 5 games on November 1st! The ladies are moving on to Section Championships, at Red Bluff High on November 3.






FRESHMAN TRIP TO PATRICK'S POINT 2018
