In the competition they were a winner of their Division Team Challenge, which is a lab based activity where they were the most accurate at Dendochronology (geological dating based on tree rings.) 




SCIENCE BOWL 2019



SAT http://sat.collegeboard.org/home

The College Board website is where students register for the SAT. The SAT essay section is optional now. It's strongly recommended that students register for the SAT with Essay. This website also provides comprehensive information and a helpful action plan for juniors and parents. Students applying for admission at a four year university/college should take the SAT or ACT the spring of the junior year. Students may submit 4 scores for free to the college/s of choice at the time of registration. Thereafter, SAT scores are submitted online from the SAT registration website to the college/s of choice.

SAT Subject Tests http://sat.collegeboard.org/home

These are hour-long tests in specific subject areas taken separately from the SAT to help determine college acceptance (please check the admissions website). Starting fall 2012, the UC System no longer requires two SAT Subject Tests as part of the admissions requirement; however, for competitive campuses and majors, it's recommended students take at least two SAT Subject Tests in related subject areas. Most private colleges require at least two SAT Subject Tests. SAT Subject Tests scores are submitted online from the SAT registration website to the college/s of choice.

ACT http://www.actstudent.org

The ACT website is where students register for the ACT. This website also provides helpful college exploration information. Important note: The ACT writing section is optional. It's strongly recommended that students take the optional writing section. If you choose to take the writing component, you must select the optional writing test when you register. Students may submit 4 scores for free to the college/s of choice at the time of registration. Thereafter, ACT scores are submitted online from the ACT registration website to the college/s of choice.

















Senior Stunt Athletes!

U-Prep's ace is Dylan Cabral, a left-handed senior who leads the Northern Section in strikeouts. He has the fourth-best ERA (2.20) in the section out of pitchers with at least 40 innings thrown. Panthers coach Bradd Miller said he senses the relief from opposing coaches when they realize Cabral won't be on the mound. "Everybody knows who he is at this point," Miller said. "Even if (hitters) are on their game, there's a good chance he's going to be able to dominate." While U-Prep (17-10) competes in Division IV, Cabral has performed against small and large schools alike. He made a statement in his first game of the season, throwing a no-hitter with 10 strikeouts against Mt. Shasta. He also led the Panthers to a 4-3 win over Foothill, giving up 1 earned run and 3 hits in a complete game against the Division II team. Cabral's arsenal includes a fastball that hovers around 78-79 mph, a curveball and a split-finger changeup. Miller said Cabral has attracted attention from Simpson University and a number of local junior colleges.







U-Prep's Boys Golf Awarded Team of the Week By Shasta County Sports April 8th-12th


AP RETREAT 2019

ADVANCED PLACEMENT (AP) RETREAT ~ READY, SET, GO!!

The AP Retreat is an intense weekend of content specific AP Exam prep combined with study time, group session studying and team-building activities. The foundation of the retreat is a series of AP Exam review sessions led by U-Prep AP instructors with a focus on one-on-one AP studying and preparation in small groups. Exam Review sessions were individualized by course and included development of course-specific study plans and unit-by-unit content review, practice exams, concept and vocabulary studying and review. 

Parents' Guide to Required Immunizations

- Diphtheria, Tetanus, and Pertussis (DTaP, DTP, Tdap, or Td) 5 doses (4 doses OK if one was given on or after 4th birthday. 3 doses OK if one was given on or after 7th birthday.) For 7th-12th graders, at least 1 of the doses of pertussiscontaining vaccine is required on or after 7th birthday.
- Polio (OPV or IPV) 4 doses (3 doses OK if one was given on or after 4th birthday)
- Hepatitis B 3 doses
- Measles, Mumps, and Rubella (MMR) 2 doses (Both given on or after 1st birthday)
- Varicella (Chickenpox) 2 doses

In addition:

- The above requirements apply to new admissions and transfers for all grades.
- Personal beliefs waivers signed before 2016 are only valid until the 7-12 grade checkpoint see shotsforschool.org.
- Medical waivers will be reviewed by the school nurse to ensure that they meet revised requirements. Please see shotsforschool.org for new requirements for Medical Waivers.
- California schools are required to check immunization records for all new student admissions at TK/Kindergarten through 12th grade and all students advancing to 7th grade before entry. Parents must show their child's Immunization Record as proof of immunization.
