Superintendent/Principal's Message

Congratulations to the Class of 2017! 117 graduates walked the Marr Auditorium stage to receive their U-Prep diploma in one of the most historic and beautiful buildings in Shasta County. This year's ceremony was another wonderful celebration of an outstanding class, 85% of whom met the University of California and California State University A-G admission requirements. It is also worth noting that 74% of this year's graduating class were accepted to 4-year universities (private and public), and 97% are entering community or four-year colleges this fall. This class also received over \$1,000,000 in scholarship money thanks to the many generous organizations listed on page 2 of this month's newsletter. The graduation ceremony hosted one alumni speaker, Bond Isheim - Class of 2013, and three graduate speakers: Joven Longee, Parker Swanson, and Skyler Leak. The messages each of our four speakers shared were exceptional and reflective of the positive impact the entire U-Prep school-community has had on their life trajectory, 6th through 12th grade. Each speaker conveyed a heart-felt relational message whose common denominator existed in the values of persistence and hard work, and the close-knit relationships that fueled motivation, self-efficacy, and the courage needed to take on new challenges. Following the ceremony, graduates were provided with a parent-organized Sober Grad event. A special thank you goes out to the parents who planned and orchestrated a safe venue for post-graduation festivities. Best wishes to our graduates on all future endeavors!

A round of applause to our Latin students who did exceedingly well on their National Latin Exams. 136,891 students from all 50 states and 16 foreign countries were administered an exam. The exam was administered in 3,195 schools, including 23 colleges and 18 elementary schools. On the 2017 exams, 52,554 (38.4%) test takers earned awards. At U-Prep, **55%** of the advanced Latin students (Latin II, III, & IV/V) earned an award, and **46%** of the students enrolled in Intro to Latin (Latin I course -8^{th} grade) earned an award! "Where Everyone Belongs"

This is going to be an exciting opportunity for your student to meet and bond with their classmates as well as get to know our campus before school starts. A pizza dinner will be served, and more information will be available as we get closer to August 8th.



Link Crew

All incoming 9th grade students are encouraged to participate in Link Crew activities. Link Crew is a high school transition program that welcomes freshmen and helps them to feel comfortable throughout their first year of the high school experience. Link Crew orientation will be on Friday, August 11th. More information about WEB and Link Crew will be included in the Superintendent/ Principal's summer letter.



Summer break is a perfect opportunity for your students to gain experience through paid or volunteer jobs, internships and other summer activities — pursuits that can also demonstrate a student's sense of responsibility to college admission officers. How can you help your students choose the most rewarding summer activities?

First, encourage students to talk to adults in their lives who can help them find activities that match their interests. Next, share the following ideas and suggestions with your students as they begin the search for that perfect summer job or internship.

1. Follow a passion

Ask your students, "If you could do anything this summer, what would it be?" For example, a student who enjoys the outdoors and hiking could look into working at a summer camp or national park.

2. Get a taste of a future career

Advise students to experience the careers they hope to pursue. They can start by calling businesses and organizations related to their chosen field about summer jobs or <u>internships</u>. Professionals in any career often go out of their way to help a motivated student, so even if they're not hiring they may have suggestions.

3. Create an internship

During a job search, students may come across a potential employer — someone who inspires them or to whom they'd love to apprentice — who just can't afford to hire them. One option is to offer to work for free. The job skills gained may be worth their weight in gold.

4. Create a business

Motivated and mature students may find it rewarding to start their own small businesses. A bilingual student can advertise services as a language tutor, and a student with a green thumb can become an independent landscaper. Tell students to start lining up a few clients before the summer — and warn them that being your own boss can be hard work.

5. Think outside the box

Doing something constructive with summer vacation doesn't necessarily mean having a traditional job. Students who are really into performing or sports may want to devote their full-time energy to formally developing these skills. Encourage these students to look into special programs or <u>summer learning programs</u>.

6. Volunteer

Spending a summer pitching in at a local charity is a great way for students to learn about life and themselves. It can help them develop leadership skills that will last a lifetime. Students can <u>volunteer</u> and discover how to help others — while helping themselves.

7. Read! Read! Read!

Whatever students decide to do this summer — work, volunteer, intern or study — encourage them to read. Reading opens students' minds and introduces them to other worlds while sharpening important skills such as comprehension and vocabulary. Before school lets out, challenge them to generate a list of summer reading based on recommendations from you, teachers and parents.
