U-Prep once again was recognized as one of **America's Most Challenging High Schools**. Schools are ranked through an index formula invented by <u>The Washington Post</u> education columnist Jay Mathews. The index formula is a ratio of the number of Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate and Advanced International Certificate of Education tests given at a school in 2016, divided by the number of seniors who graduated in the same year. U-Prep's holds a State rank of 35 and a National ranking of 301, which places us in the top 1% of the high schools in the U.S.!

U-Prep was also awarded a GOLD MEDAL standing by the U.S. News and World Report: Best High Schools! Our State rank is 55 and our National ranking is 359. More than 21,000 public schools in 50 states and the District of Columbia were ranked and awarded gold, silver or bronze medals. Data used to determine awards included state assessment data, graduation rates, and how well each school prepares all of their students for college. College readiness was determined using the Advanced Placement participation rate – the number of 12th grade students who took at least one AP test before or during their senior year, divided by the number of seniors. Further, a quality-adjusted participation rate was calculated based on the number of 12th grade students who took and passed at least one of the tests before or during their senior year, divided by the number of 12th graders at the school. An AP score of 3 or higher is considered passing. This month, our high school students head into Advanced Placement testing. U-Prep will administer 480 exams this year, which is 100 more than the prior year. In essence, approximately 44% of our high school students in grades 9 through 12 will participate in this academic challenge. A special note of appreciation to our wonderful AP teachers for working hard to prepare their students for the exams, and for providing an additional opportunity for success through offering an AP Retreat at Whiskeytown Environmental Camp.

Overall, the weekend was described by students as productive, helpful, studious, supportive, caring and even *fun*!











New California School Immunization Law (SB277) requires that children be up to date on their immunizations (shots) to attend school. There are no personal belief exemptions for children advancing to 7th grade or grace periods for school entry without immunizations.

What You Will Need For Admission

To attend school, your child's Immunization Record must show the date for each required shot below. If you do not have an Immunization Record or your child has not received all required shots, call your doctor now for an appointment. Don't wait for the new school year or your child may miss the first day of school. Immunizations Required for School Entry into 7th Grade

DTaP, DTP, or DT

Polio

Hepatitis **B**

MMR (Measles, Mumps, Rubella)

Varicella (Chickenpox)

Tdap

Note: Students who are completely unimmunized will need to complete the full series of vaccinations - that can take up to 6 months, require five different immunizations, and at least 3 visits.
