## College Readiness Assessments – The PSAT/NMSQT

As a part of the college planning process at U-Prep, all 9<sup>th</sup> grade students take the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) compliments of the school. This test will help students determine what they need to work on most and it serves as a baseline measurement of college and career readiness. This test also provides firsthand practice for the SAT. This year, the PSAT will be administered by freshmen teachers on Wednesday, October 14<sup>th</sup> during first through fourth period.

Many sophomores and juniors choose take the PSAT again as an additional precursor to their actual SAT test experience, which is wise. Additionally, we encourage upper classmen to take both the SAT and ACT admission exams. Fall parent information nights are scheduled (see Page 5) to ensure parents have access to important information on college-going activities. Be sure to follow our school website and peruse the monthly newsletters for more information on these events.

## College Readiness – The New SAT

The College Board is set to roll out new changes to the SAT in March 2016. The U-Prep faculty is up-to-speed with these changes and working to further enhance and already outstanding instructional program. The College Board website (collegereadiness.collegeboard.org) is a wonderful resource for those interested in learning more about the changes. Notably, the College Board and KHAN Academy have partnered to create an official SAT practice experience for students and it free! Welcome back to school! We have had a great first month and it is wonderful to see all the smiling and sometimes sleepy faces! In this month's newsletter, we have a few friendly reminders regarding dress code and student safety/supervision:

- Pages 20 and 21 of our Student/Parent Handbook provide detailed information on our **school dress code**. Additionally, we need your help in being good neighbors with our local business by *not* parking in their parking lots (e.g. ACE, doctor's offices). Your support is appreciated!

The **PSAT** will be administered on Wednesday, October 14th at U-Prep. The PSAT is the best preparation for the SAT, which is a college entrance exam that assesses academic readiness when applying to a 4 year college. Sophomores and Juniors planning to attend a 4-year university should take the PSAT. The fee is \$15 and students register through the ASB office.

Historically, students who take the PSAT/ NMSQT score higher on average on the SAT than those who do not. Please see page 2 for more information on test prep and the SAT.

# What are the A-G requirements?

The purpose of this article is to introduce what are called the "A-G" requirements. A-G refers to the minimum high school courses required for entrance to the University of California and California State University systems. They are labeled as such because there are seven general subject areas. The California State University system requires a minimum of a "C" grade in all A-G courses whereas the University of California system requires a 3.0 Grade Point Average in the A-G courses (a "C" grade can be balanced by an "A" grade in another class). Students must earn a "C" or better in these designated areas in order to be eligible to apply for admission to the University of California and California State University school systems. Taking the recommended number of courses versus simply the recommended number of courses positively impacts a student's chance of being admitted.

At U-Prep, the A-G course requirements align to the high school graduation requirements. **Eighty-five percent of the graduates from the Class of 2015 were A-G eligible**, which is significantly more than any other local high school program. Congratulations, Class of 2015!

# The UC/CSU Required "A-G" Courses

# A. History/Social Science:

U.S. History, U.S. Government, Civics, World History, Cultures and Geography Years required: Two (2) years; 1 year U.S. History or 1/2 year of U.S. History and 1/2 year of U.S. Civics or American Government; and 1 year of World History, Culture, and Geography

# B. English

College preparatory English composition and literature Years required: Four (4) years

# C. Mathematics

Algebra, Geometry, Intermediate Algebra, or higher level mathematics Years required: Three (3) years required, Four (4) years recommended

# D. Laboratory Science

Three (3) years required (two of the following: Biology, Chemistry, Physics, or other approved college preparatory science)

## E. Language other than English

Two (2) years required; Three (3) years recommended (at least two years of the same language)

F. Visual and performing arts: Dance, Drama/Theater, Music, Visual Art Years required: 1 year

# G. College-Preparatory Electives

One (1) year of academic courses in addition to "a-f" courses beyond those used to satisfy the requirements above, or courses that have been approved solely in the elective area.







Way to go, U-Prep!

In the spring of 2015 California secondary students in grades 6, 7, 8, and 11 were administered the new state assessments online. Scores from this spring serve as baseline scores moving forward with the new online Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments. Each test, English language arts/literacy (ELA) and math is composed on two parts:

(1) a computer adaptive portion and (2) a "Performance Task" component. In addition to the new state assessment, students in grades eight and ten were administered a STAR California Standards Tests in science. The grade eight science test covered science content standards only from grade eight curriculum whereas the grade ten test covered middle school life science and high school biology content standards.

State test scores provide a glimpse into a much bigger picture of student performance. They add perspective to other pieces of data such as Advanced Placement scores, academic grades, student involvement in fine arts and athletics/activities, A-G eligibility figures, and the master schedule course offerings set within a schedule that is designed to meet students' needs. Next steps with the state test data include drilling down into the patterns of performance in specific areas of English language arts/Literacy (ELA) and math. Performance scores for ELA are reflected in the following areas: Reading, Writing, Listening, and Research/Inquiry. Performance scores for math are as follows: Problem Solving & Modeling/Data Analysis, Concepts & Procedures, and Communicating Reasoning. Staff analysis of this data will serve to inform classroom instruction.

State test scores provide a glimpse into a much bigger picture of student performance. They add perspective to other pieces of data such as Advanced Placement scores, academic grades, student involvement in fine arts and athletics/activities, A-G eligibility figures, and the master schedule course offerings set within a schedule that is designed to meet students' needs. Next steps with the state test data include drilling down into the patterns of performance in specific areas of English language arts/Literacy (ELA) and math. Performance scores for ELA are reflected in the following areas: Reading, Writing, Listening, and Research/Inquiry. Performance scores for math are as follows: Problem Solving & Modeling/Data Analysis, Concepts & Procedures, and Communicating Reasoning. Staff analysis of this data will serve to inform classroom instruction.
